Mrs. Carrie Lam, GBS, JP, is the Chief Secretary for Administration of the Hong Kong SAR Government from July 1, 2012. She became a Principal Official on July 1, 2007 when she was appointed as Secretary for Development. Before assuming the post, Mrs. Lam had served the Government as an Administrative Officer for about 27 years. She joined the Administrative Service in August 1980, and rose to the rank of Administrative Officer Staff Grade A1 in September 2006. Mrs. Lam has served in various bureaux and departments. She was Director of Social Welfare from August 2000 to October 2003, Permanent Secretary for Housing, Planning and Lands (Planning and Lands) from November 2003 to May 2004, and Director-General of the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office, London, from September 2004 to March 2006. She was Permanent Secretary for Home Affairs before her appointment as the Secretary for Development.

Professor Sonny S. H. Lo is Professor and Head in the Department of Social Sciences at the Hong Kong Institute of Education (HKIED). His recent publications include the Politics of Cross-Border Crime in Greater China (2009), the Dynamics of Beijing-Hong Kong Relations: A Model for Taiwan (2008), and Political Change in Macao (2008).

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Dr. Jason K. Y. Chan is the Head of Information Technology of the College of Professional and Continuing Education of The Hong Kong Polytechnic University (PolyU). He is also the Chairman and Director of Hong Kong Mensa which is a high IQ society to provide a forum for intellectual exchange among its members. He was the Fellow of Public Policy Research Institute of PolyU. Recently, he has been appointed as member of Advisory Committee on the Education Development Fund (EDF) of Education Bureau, HKSAR. Prior to joining PolyU, he was the Manager (Research) of Bauhinia Foundation Research Centre, an independent policy think tank to the HKSAR Government through the support of relevant policy research work and studies.

Professor Robert J. Morris holds the Juris Doctor from the University of Utah S. J. Quinney College of Law, and the PhD in comparative Chinese law from the University of Hong Kong, where he taught in the Department of Law until his retirement in 2011.
