Dr. Peter K.W. Fong is President of Hong Kong Public Administration Association and Research Associate, Faculty of Education, The University of Hong Kong. He was formerly a Fellow of Judge Business School, University of Cambridge, U.K.; Director of EMBA and Executive Programmes, HKU Business School; Head of Centre for Executive Development, HKU SPACE; Associate Professor of Department of Urban Planning & Urban Design, HKU; Professor and Executive Vice President of Asia International Open University (Macau); Studies Director of Civil Service Training & Development Institute, Hong Kong SAR Government; and Consultant of the World Bank.

Mr. Leung Chun-ying, GBM, GBS, JP, is Chief Executive-elect of the Hong Kong SAR Government. He was Convenor of the Executive Council of HKSARG and a member of the National Standing Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference. He is a founder and Chairman of the Hong Kong Coalition of Professional Services and Chairman of the One Country Two Systems Research Institute. He was Secretary General of the Basic Law Consultative Committee (1988-90), Leader of the Political Sub-Group of the Preliminary Working Committee (1993-95), Vice Chairman of the Preparatory Committee for HKSAR (1996-97) and Member of the Provisional Legislative Council (1997-98). He was Chairman of the Council of Lingnan University and Chairman of DTZ Debenham Tie Leung Ltd.

Professor Peter P. Yuen is the Dean of the College of Professional and Continuing Education of The Hong Kong Polytechnic University (PolyU). He is also a Principal Investigator of the Public Policy Research Institute, and Professor in the Department of Management and Marketing of PolyU. His current research involves the evaluation of public sector reform initiatives and in particular, the evaluation of the impact of change in the public/private mix in health care financing and delivery. Professor Yuen has been a consultant for the Hong Kong SAR Government and the Bauhinia Foundation on a number of projects including the West Kowloon Cultural District, Subsidized Home Ownership, Sustainable Built Environment, Tobacco Control, Managed Care, and Health Systems Reform.

Professor Sonny S.H. Lo is Associate Dean (Research & Postgraduate Studies) of Faculty of Arts and Sciences, Head and Professor at the Department of Social Sciences and Associate Director of Centre for Governance and Citizenship at the Institute. Before joining HKIEd, he had worked at the University of Waterloo in Canada, The University of Hong Kong, The Hong Kong University of Science and Technology, Murdoch University, Lingnan College (now Lingnan University), and the University of East Asia (Macau). His recent publications include the Politics of Cross-Border Crime in Greater China (2009), the Dynamics of Beijing-Hong Kong Relations: A Model for Taiwan (2008), and Political Change in Macao (2008).

Professor Jon Quah is an Anti-Corruption Consultant based in Singapore. He was Professor of Political Science at the National University of Singapore (NUS) and Co-editor of the Asian Journal of Political Science until his retirement in June 2007.
